- 1. a) What are the difference between the Greek agrist and imperfect? (4 marks).
  - b) Mention the three kinds of aorist as presented in the self-learning material (2 marks)

The time of action of aorist is expressed in the past and as a kind of action that would appear as *simply performed*. This is the major difference between the imperfect and the aorist. The imperfect indicates continuous action in the past (for example: I was loosing) but the aorist indicates a finished action in the past (for example: I loosed). The Greek aorist would correspond more to the simple past tense and the perfect tense of the English language.

b) Mention the three kinds of aorist as presented in the self-learning material (2 marks)

The three kinds of Aorist: constative, ingressive and culminative aorist

c) Describe the nature of the aorists (4 marks)

Constantive Aorist

Though the action may take a considerable time to be completed, it is presented in its entirety as a single act that occurred at a moment.

Ingressive Aorist

The action is viewed from its inception, that is, the point of initiation

Culminative Aorist

The culminative agrist views the action as having occurred but emphasizes the end of the action or the state of being, resulting from the action.

- 2. a) List the five major cases associated with Greek noun (5 marks).

- (a) Nominative (1 mark), vocative (1 mark), accusative (1 mark), genitive (1 mark), and dative (1 mark).

b) Briefly describe their respective functions (5 marks)

#### i. The Nominative Case

Subject or topic of the sentence. It is the case of designation. As a complement subject, and sometimes used in apposition. The main subject is mostly associated with definite article (1 mark)

#### ii. The Accusative Case

The accusative case is usually used for the direct object. The direct object receives the action of the verb in the sentence. It marks the limit or the end of an action. (1 mark)

#### iii. The Dative Case

The dative case is the noun of indirect object. It is often associated with the idea of the person or thing to whom and or for whom something is done. It is the case of interest. Sometimes the locative and the instrumental cases are associated with the dative case. (1 mark)

#### iv. The Genitive Case

Genitive indicates the ownership of a particular thing. It is used as a case of description, and to attribute quality to the word it modifies. It also serves for the ablative case, which is the case of separation. (1 mark)

#### v. The Vocative Case

The vocative case is the case of address. (1 mark)

# 3. State the (a) verbal (6 marks), (b) adjectival (2 marks) and (c) adverbial (2 marks) functions of the participle.

### a) Verbal

Only four Greek tenses, namely: present, aorist, future and perfect has participles.

- i. The present participle indicates action that is contemporaneous with the action of the main verb.
- ii. The agriculture indicates action that is antecedent to the action of the main verb.
- iii. The future participle indicates action which is subsequent to the action of the main verb.
- iv. The perfect participle indicates action which has become a state of being.

### b) Adjectival

It modifies the main verb and informs the reader when, how, why, on what condition, by what means, or under what circumstances an action took place.

### c) Adverbial

It qualifies a noun, and should agree with the noun it is modifying in gender, number and case. It can be used substantively but with the relative translation. It can also have woman who is saying these things
